Appendix: H1-E UNICEF Survey Tips

NDI/Nepal Tips for Conducting a Household Survey

Thankfully acknowledged from UNICEF

Things to remember while doing the survey: Information from the survey needs to be very useful for the projects in the village. Questions should be asked in simple language, using time efficiently. Villagers usually have very little free time. Manage your time so you can meet with them when they are free. Respect their thoughts and advice. Ask the questions in an informal way. How to interview? By going to the house or field: Along with the work: without disturbing their work: By being encouraging; By using simple and understood language; By letting them express their thoughts and problems; By greeting and thanking the interviewee; By demonstrating respect; If the interviewee is woman, by using respectful languages so that other family members don't get upset with you. Advice to develop a good relationship

Greet the interviewee respectfully, by saying "Namaste".

Make your introduction politely.

Be friendly.

Use local language as much as possible.

Address them as relatives (such as, father, mother, uncle, aunt, sister, brother etc.). Do not call them by name if possible.

Speak informally. Speak as if you were talking with your friends. Villagers tend to like to talk about household matters. So ask them about their families. Women like to be asked about their parents' home and about their children.

Briefly explain to them your project.

Be patient. Even if they speak off the subject, don't interrupt them.

Listen to them sympathetically if they want to express their thoughts on something. They will stop talking after you do not respond.

Sit on the ground if the interviewee sits on the ground.

If they offer you anything to eat or drink, accept it (unless you have health problems). If you reject their offers of hospitality, they may feel insulted.
